



# **EIOLT WINS GRANT FOR EDISTO COMMUNITY**



The Edisto Island Open Land Trust proved that persistence pays off when, after three years of applying, it successfully secured grant funding from the U.S. Department of Transportation to preserve Edisto's scenic and historic Highway 174. The grant was awarded so that the Edisto community could map out a plan for the future of 174, which is prerequisite for gaining the National Scenic Byways designation and protection.

The National Scenic Byways Program recognizes selected roads based on their cultural, historic, natural, recreational or scenic qualities. A "Corridor Management Plan," must be developed to qualify for the National Scenic Byway designation, which will involve using grant funds to hire a biologist, historian, writer, and meeting facilitator from Clemson University to work with the community to create a collaborative vision of Highway 174's future. Additional funding and in-kind services will be donated by the EIOLT and by Clemson University's Strom Thurmond Institute, which was involved

with the Corridor Management Plan for Ashley River Road, now a National Scenic Byway.

Marian Brailsford, EIOLT Executive Director, said, "Building a community consensus on the future of Edisto's Highway 174 will directly impact the protection of our entire island and way of life." The Corridor Management Planning (CMP) process will take about 12 months to complete and will involve everyone in the Edisto community. It will be led by the Highway 174 Scenic Byway Coalition,

sisting of leaders from Edisto's non-profit organizations and churches, as well as other local groups that can provide input and assistance. EIOLT is spearheading the recruitment of local leaders for the Coalition, which will have its first meeting in early September. On October 5 there will be a "community stakeholders meeting" to gather ideas from everyone in the community. At this meeting a number of volunteers will be given disposable cameras to photograph the sights



and sites on Edisto that they think should be preserved, as well as what needs to be avoided or changed in the future. The Corridor Management Plan will include such themes as: protection of the natural habitat, waterways, ancient trees and historic sites along the highway; enhancements to the views along the road; and measures to encourage safety on the road.

Getting the National Scenic Byway designation could provide the community with leverage for keeping Edisto rural and scenic and for preventing undesirable sprawl and urbanization. Executive Director Brailsford added, "This is an historic opportunity for the people of our community to take part in shaping Highway 174's and our island's future. We are privileged to take part in a project that could have such an important influence on our quality of life on Edisto."

#### Edisto Island's Highway 174 Targeted for National Scenic Byway Designation

More than 200 local communities in 42 states received good news recently when the U.S. Department of Transportation announced grant funding for scenic highways. Edisto Island's Highway 174 is one of these highways targeted for "National Scenic Byway" designation.

A lmost everyone agrees that we need to preserve the breathtaking vistas along our main roadway, with its ancient oak trees and marsh panoramas. But Highway 174 is more than a pretty road – it is the community's lifeline and the main artery in the body of land known as Edisto Island. If main artery becomes crowded with growth (plaque), artery becomes clogged and the health and well being of the island is threatened. The best "prescription" is to prevent the runaway growth before it happens. The plan to preserve
