A PARTNERSHIP FOR THE COMMUNITY

The Edisto Island Open Land Trust announces our collaboration with Edisto Island Youth Recreation (EIYR) that includes an important conservation easement on their Edisto Island Community Recreation Area project. EIYR is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization on the Island whose mission is to provide opportunities for athletics and recreational activities for the youth of Edisto Island and neighboring communities. They maintain the Pat Stuart Ball Field on Indigo Hill Road and have regular after school programs. With our assistance, EIYR successfully applied to the Charleston County Greenbelt Program for the purchase of land to build a community recreation area, for use by all of Edisto Island.

The property on Clark Road is 145.5 acres of mostly farm fields but it is also crisscrossed with channelized wetlands and bordered by a mature floodplain forest, which provide excellent wildlife habitat. The property is zoned for agricultural use and the plan is to retain it partially as such. EIYR hopes to build the island's first recreational complex with an indoor gymnasium, playground, walking trails, basketball court, and a multipurpose field to support sports programs. The primary goals of their project are to build these athletic facilities and to

make it a public recreation center and community hub for all of Edisto Island.

EIYR is only allowed to utilize a fraction of the land to build the facilities and infrastructure. Their plan is to design their complex to minimize damage to the environment and the land's conservation values. Knowing this, they approached EIOLT to help identify important and sensitive habitat before applying to the Greenbelt Program. The Greenbelt application was approved in July of 2020 with the requirement that a conservation easement be placed on the property to ensure its protection into the future.

Not only does this mean the permanent protection of the property's habitat, wetlands, and most productive farm land, it also creates an opportunity for much needed amenities for the health and wellbeing of the people of Edisto Island. Much like the Hutchinson House, this is an example of community conservation at work, a process when a land trust expands its mission to bridge the gap between the needs of the environment and the needs of its community to work towards a mutually beneficial project. With this conservation easement, we hope a brighter future for Edisto Island will be created and protected.

VIRTUAL CONNECTIONS WITH CONVERSATIONS IN THE FIELD

Connecting everyone who loves Edisto through educational outreach programs has always been an important part of our mission. In previous years at the Educational Learning Center at Edisto Beach State Park, we have offered in-person lectures with guest speakers in a variety of fields. Field trips have taken place visiting a beekeeper's property, kayaking on Big Bay Creek, birding on local protected properties and learning how to crab in our local creeks. During the past year, these options were no longer available but the need to provide educational experiences were even more important as

we worked to stay connected to each other and our environment. Melinda Hare, Education Outreach Coordinator, created the concept of "Conversations in the Field" and a new method of delivering programming was born.

Our first episode took our viewers, literally, into the farm fields of Rooting Down Farms, an organic farm on Edisto Island. Harleston Towles, a young and successful farmer, engaged and enlightened us all about the importance of local farmers, regenerative farming and this agricultural model.

Lindsey Young, EIOLT board member, treated us to a virtual kayaking experience in Big Bay Creek and St. Helena Sound in Episode 2. Using her local knowledge as a kayak guide and master naturalist, we took a leisurely paddle, seen through her eyes, to view our local waterways and wildlife.

We showcased the botanical environment surrounding the Hutchinson House with our Land Protection Specialist and biologist, Tom Austin, in Episode 3. Learning about this small but mighty ecosystem gave us all a new appreciation for the biodiversity surrounding us.
