ACQUISITION FUND

2024 was a productive year for EIOLT in the land conservation arena and we've set ourselves up for a fantastic start in 2025. We conserved three new properties in 2024, and all three were possible because of our Land Acquisition Fund.

Today, tremendous public funding opportunities exist for protecting land on Edisto Island. Yet, those funds aren't guaranteed and can take over half a year to reach our bank account. That's a lifetime in today's hot real estate market. This is what makes our Acquisition Fund instrumental in our strategy for protecting Edisto Island. It gives EIOLT the means to buy land and protect it now, and get a grant refund later. A revolving fund for buying at-risk land.

That's how we were able to protect two lots along historic Point of Pines Road in 2024. We purchased both lots using the Acquisition Fund, protected them from development, and have now received over \$380,000 in grants to reimburse our costs and open the land for public use.

These grants refund EIOLT's costs but never quite all the way. The Acquisition Fund absorbs these extra expenses. This lets us keep momentum when unforeseen costs arise and gives EIOLT the flexibility to work with landowners to protect their land, even if they can't afford the legal fees. For example, the Acquisition Fund covered the costs for the conservation easement on Liz Smylie's planned gift of land in 2024.

Looking back at our past 30 years, and forward to our next 30, the Acquisition Fund was irreplaceable in our past successes, and is still a cornerstone in our mission to protect Edisto Island, forever.
